COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION

Whether you are coming to Ontario just to go to school or intend to stay in Canada permanently, your engagement in the community will have a big impact on the success of your experience as an international student. There are many ways of becoming involved in your community both on campus and off.

ON CAMPUS

Colleges and universities throughout Ontario have a variety of student clubs and organizations on campus. Some groups have a professional focus while others are social or cultural in nature. Other groups involve sports and activities, and some are focused on volunteering and providing services.

Look for information on campus about different groups, when they meet and how you can join.

OFF CAMPUS

Community Recreation Centres and Parks

Most communities in Ontario have a place where community groups can meet. Many centres and local parks also have skating rinks, swimming pools, gyms and sports fields. Programs for adults and children are either free or offered at a low cost. Call 211 or visit www.211ontario.ca to find your local recreation centres. Ontario parks offer a variety of recreational activities across the province including camping, hiking and water activities. For more information please visit ontarioparks.com.

Public Libraries

Here are some types of programs and resources that may be available at your local library:

- English as a second language resource
- Settlement workers who provide information
- Homework clubs for students and reading clubs for children.

- Free public internet access.
- Books, CDs, DVDs, video games, newspapers and magazines in English and other languages available to take out.

To get a library card, you will need one piece of identification (passport or driver's license) and proof of your address in the same region or municipality of the library, such as a telephone, hydro or cable bill or a document from your educational institution. Late return fees may apply if you return your books or other resources past the return date.

Places of Worship

Under the Charter of Rights and Freedoms, Canadians have the freedom to practise their religion. While Ontario is a secular society, many Ontarians express their faith by gathering in churches, synagogues, mosques, temples and other places of worship. 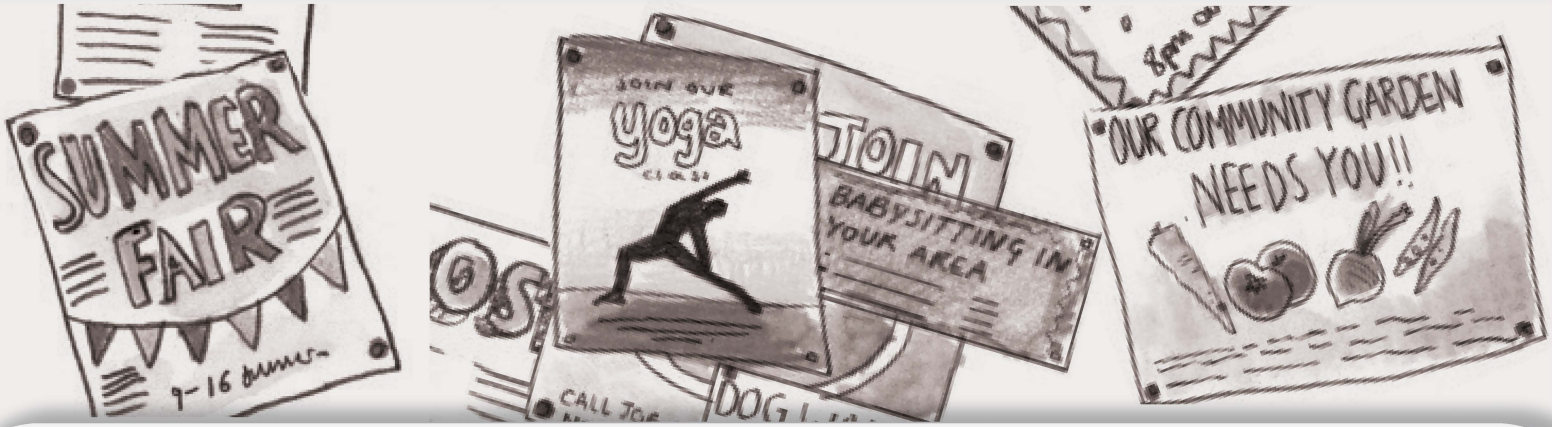
To find a place of worship near you:
